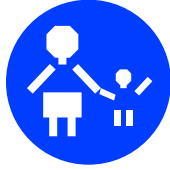

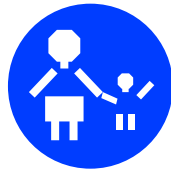
THE POWER OF KNOWING

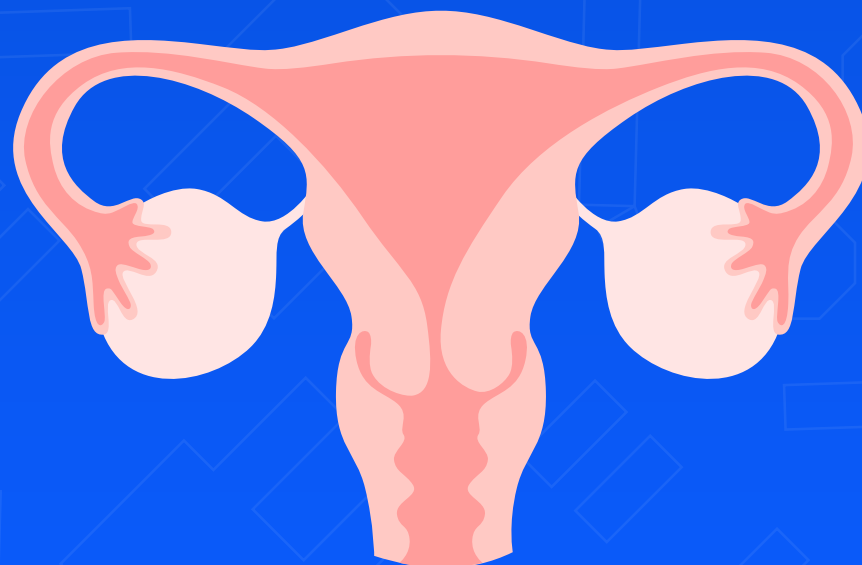

KNOWLEDGE GAVE HER CHOICE

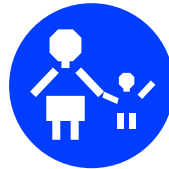

READY ON HER OWN TERMS

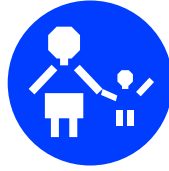

RISING TO LEAD

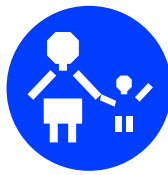
